I hope everyone was able to enjoy the wonderful weather we had this summer and early fall, and maintain contact with friends and loved ones. Despite the cessation of our monthly meetings, it has certainly been a busy time for TWS, with the successful first online Artists' Choice Show from June to August and the first online Annual General Meeting (AGM) held Sept 9. I would like to express my appreciation to the numerous members, executives and board members whose efforts ensured that both events were successful.

It was a last-minute decision to substitute the Spring Aquavision Juried Show with the Artists' Choice Online show due to the government's closing down of all public gathering venues. Leading up to the Artists' Choice Show there was a renewed effort to complete the new website to post the June show, and I want to thank all those involved with the upgrades to the previous website and to Ana Jurpik, a long-time consultant to TWS, for providing her expertise in graphics, website layout and content to refine the new website. The renewed website will continue to evolve with more content, and if you have suggestions, please let us know.

The AGM was attended by approximately 60 members, and there were introductions to several new positions on the board and executive. John Van Gameren became the Vice-President; Ann Harvey vacated the Newsletter Chair position and became a Director; and Christine Currie became Newsletter Chair. I welcome them all to their new positions and look forward to their contributions to the on-going success of the TWS.

I want to thank Suzanne for the work she did during her term as President. I had the benefit of watching Suzanne implement valuable changes in how our society operates and will also benefit in future from the rigorous and thorough documentation and refinement of guidelines she developed for executives. I look to Suzanne's input as Past President and her continued insight on matters that may arise.

At the AGM, Carolyne Pascoe presented the awards to numerous artists and when our physical meetings resume, each recipient will receive their award plaques.

The AGM also included a Q&A Open Forum during which questions were read and answers provided. These will be included in the minutes to be issued at a later date.

The Society's success is due to several things: the high standard of painting demonstrations at our monthly meetings, our numerous workshops by world-calibre guest artists, and the extensive group of volunteers that take on one of the 17 Chair roles and who, in turn, rely on the support of additional volunteers.

Despite the downside that no physical face-to-face meeting was possible, on the upside, both events demonstrated our willingness to shift to the online engagement. We have received feedback and suggestions to host more online events, which will include our monthly painting demonstrations and our special workshops. We continue to assess how to provide informal online sessions that could offer a shared environment to socially paint, get artistic feedback on technique or provide common themes to paint. Due to the recent increase in covid cases and government mandates we will hold off on any plein air sessions.

I know of many members who already give online classes, and we will endeavor to post their names and classes on our website so that anyone can contact them.

I trust that members are submitting paintings to our Fall Aquavision Juried Show. Due to the restrictions of the Covid-19 Pandemic, the Papermill Gallery at Todmorden Mills is closed for now and is not available to host our show. This exhibition will be an on-line only at our TWS website.

During this period of mandated limitations to social gatherings, we have lost that regular flow of information about members, and Carolyne Pascoe provides updates within this newsletter. I would encourage members to reach out and contact other members, and to send updates on how you are faring. We realize that many members may not enjoy the online zoom events, which can be hard on the eyes and challenging to hear clearly what is being discussed. We are reviewing other platforms to see what might improve the quality of our presentations.

Thank you, and I look forward to serving TWS and its members in the coming years.

MONTHLY MEMBERS MEETING SCHEDULE

In compliance with the government mandate due to covid-19, we do not have access to our meeting space. TWS will resume monthly programs by offering meetings via the Zoom platform. We will have an administrator hosting these events to facilitate members logging into the session. October 14 We resumed our program meetings on Wednesday, October 14 at 7:00 pm with some general announcements after which **Margaret Roseman** provided a painting demonstration of a fall scene.



November 18 Our November meeting will be on the third Wednesday, November 18th (NOT on November 11), starting at 7:00 pm and will feature a presentation by Canadian artist **David McEown**. David has used the medium of watercolour for the past 30 years to explore and express many of the earth's wilderness areas. His paintings from Antarctica to the North Pole are represented in collections world-wide. David is a Fellow of the Royal Canadian Geographical Society; an elected member of the Canadian Society of Painters in Watercolour, which in 2005 and 2018 awarded him the Society's prestigious A.J. Casson Medal. He is a Graduate of the Ontario College of Art and Design and is a sought after teacher sharing his reverence for nature and passion for the creative act of painting. He has conducted workshops and multimedia presentations for numerous art societies and museums.

Following David's presentation there will be an opportunity for members to pose questions and feedback from David.

December 9 Our Annual Holiday Party

Our annual holiday party will be held online on December 9, starting at 7:00 pm, and it promises to be an engaging interactive series of presentations, painting demonstrations and shared memories-not to mention "door" prizes. Details for this event will be announced at a later date.

January 14 Our first meeting in 2021 will feature **Poppy Balser**, a renowned East Coast painter. Poppy is a Signature Member of the Canadian Society of Painters in Watercolour, Signature member of the American Society of Marine Artists, Oil Painters of America, Annapolis Regional Arts Council, Plein Air Painters of the Bay of Fundy and Plein Air Art Annapolis Valley.

Poppy has always lived within walking distance of the ocean, mostly on the shores of the Bay of Fundy. She developed an early connection with the seashore which has deepened, as she studies the sea and its environs through her paintings. She understands that the wild portions of Nova Scotia's environment are a precious resource and seeks to highlight their beauty in her paintings. She paints often to keep her observations fresh and accurate. Her goal is to transfer the open air feeling of being outside nature into her studio work. in Poppy began the serious pursuit of painting in watercolours in 2003. She has since followed a path of self-directed study, choosing workshops by master painters from across the country. She has won numerous Best in Show, Best Watercolour, First and second Place, Grand Prize and Finalist Awards and is represented by Galleries like: Amicus Gallery, Chester, NS; Camden Falls Gallery, Camden, Maine, USA; The Flight of Fancy, Bear River, NS; The Harvest Gallery, Wolfville, NS and the Teichert Gallery, Halifax, NS.

February 10 Our February meeting will feature **Patti Mollica**, a well known American artist doing an a colorful acrylic city scape. Patti Mollica, a resident of New York, has been a fine artist and professional illustrator for over 30 years. Her artwork is known for its fearless use of colour and uninhibited brushwork. She delights in painting the world around her in a bold, decisive style, with hues that are intense, brilliant and contemporary. Patti will paint a vibrant city scape in Acrylics for us. Her work is represented in several galleries throughout the US. Patti is the author of three books: "Modern Acrylics, Color Theory and Acrylics getting started". She authored instructional painting DVD's and she teaches workshops throughout the US. She is also a certified Teacher for Golden paints.

St John's Newfoundland Harbour by Eric David

We took a walk from the harbour up to Signal Hill, made famous by Marconi, when in December 1901 he assembled his receiver at Signal Hill, St. John's, and received the Morse code letter for "s" transmitted from England. During our visit we also experienced that famed Newfoundland hospitality as well as a few slices of Newfoundland humour that I captured in the accompanying photos.



In the footsteps of the Group of Seven by George Eadie



All the lakes and hills were awe inspiringly beautiful and Grace Lake is the subject of over 100 Group of Seven's paintings and sketches.

We had a chance to hike to the sites of a number of my favorite Group of Seven paintings and hike up to the famous Carmichael Rock overlooking Grace Lake. I made sketches and took photographs that I will be using as references for paintings over the next few months.

It was a challenging trip for me, the hills were steep, the portages were long but the land was energizing - rugged, wild, free. I have a new appreciation for the strength, commitment and vision of the Group of Seven and other Canadian wilderness painters.

For me there is no place in the world as beautiful as Canada in the summer and fall. I can't wait for next summer.



Reflections on a New School Year by Chris Hill

School is back but it's different this year. Sharing is out, whether it's recess snacks or that glorious 24 pack of brand new, pre-sharpened pencil crayons. Masks are in, covering faces small and large to protect others but making communication – both speaking and listening - a greater challenge.

As an elementary school teacher I have had several primary art classes added to my teaching roster this year. I am constantly reminded of the importance of including this subject in the busy school timetable and also of the important lessons youngsters can teach us as adults and artists.

A recent National Geographic article by McKenna Becker revealed that creating art strengthens children's problem solving skills. As watercolour artists we have all faced challenges around capturing light, creating the perfect shade of blue or keeping the feeling of energy alive in our work. It's gratifying to know that solving these problems contributes not only to our painting but also to our gray matter!

Furthermore, Becker points out that neurologists have found that kids who create art at least once a week have greater empathy and less cortisol, the stress hormone. I think we can all attest to the relaxing properties of creative expression, particularly during these last months of negative news overload, both pandemic-related and otherwise. On the first day of each Art class this year I asked my new students, "What is your favourite thing about art?" Every student was able to answer with either a general statement such as, "I love art because it's fun" or a specific one like, "I like to draw race cars." Not one of the 5 – 8 year olds said, "I don't like art" or "I'm not good at art." Pablo Picasso once said that, "Every child is an artist. The problem is how to remain on artist once we grow up." I have noticed that older children of 11 or 12 have already begun to either embrace or reject the image of themselves as artists.

After listening to everyone's favourite thing about art, I gave a brief lesson on line as an element of design. Students were then given a paper divided into four quadrants with a different line in each one: a straight line, a small circle, a wavy line and a curved line that changed direction. Their task was to use each line as a jumping off point to creating a picture. The circle became a wheel, a bubble, a lollipop, the pompom on Santa's hat etc. Seeing the incredible variety of interpretations was repeated with each line in every class.

School is different this year but also the same. There are kids. They are artists. Art is helping them to solve problems and promotes their mental health. We can all learn from their creativity and optimism. We can all be artists as adults, whether we express ourselves with watercolour, gardening, sports or even in our relationships with others. That will never change.

Chris Hill is a member who teaches primary grade kids.

Patrick Donohue, one of our directors, and the oldest kid on the block, still embraces that innocent creativity as illustrated in his painting he did during his painting demonstration last year. The first drawing was done with the easel turned to face the audience, away from the artist who stood behind the easel, so that he couldn't see what he was doing. This was to promote looseness and freedom. The second photo shows the work with watercolour added at home, after the demo.



So take heart members, recall the wonder you had as a kid and play again on paper!

The "Grand Life" of a Painter-Pauline Holancin

A TWS Member Profile by Beth Parker

Recognized as a distinguished Canadian painter and described by TWS Founder/Director, Margaret Roseman, as someone "with a heart of gold", it's clear why both apply to long time member, **Pauline Holancin**. Pauline's contributions as a working artist as well as a volunteer literally have extended from her home in Aurora to around the world.

"The life of a painter is just grand," says Pauline, "I meet so many great people. I am especially grateful for those in the TWS who've kept it going strong."

Pauline's been a fine art painter her entire career. Today, her work can be found in many private and corporate collections in Canada and abroad. At 87, she's is still painting, working on 40 years of demos she did when leading hundreds of workshops, and adding to what she describes as "piles" of paintings in her own home.

Pauline's love of painting goes back to her days as a child when she would frequently visit the National Gallery of Canada and took classes in painting and drawing. "I haven't always lived in Aurora," she says, "I was born in Gatineau, Quebec, lived in Ottawa as a child, and during high school, moved with my parents to what was then known as Czechoslovakia." Pauline, in fact, knows Slovakian (learned from her parents) and still can understand some Czech. The town where they lived is about an hour from Prague, where Pauline frequently went as a teenager to perform as part of her gymnastics group.

Pauline started art lessons in earnest during the evenings when she was raising her "girls" (all five of them!) "I literally took art classes all over the place," she notes, including studies with well-known artists in both Canada and the USA. She soon started to teach, lead and organize workshops. Although many know Pauline's watercolour art, she actually began her painting career in oils. "Then one day, "she says, "I decided to set aside the oils and focus on watercolours." She continued to do both, and if asked which one she prefers, Pauline simply says, "Well, whatever one I'm working on right now!"

Regardless of the medium, Pauline's is primarily a plein air artist, painting a wide range of striking landscape scenes and showing nature's splendour with dynamic contrasts and bold colours. She also has a weak spot for flowers, which she loves.

"When I'm on location painting outdoors," she describes, "I almost feel part of the landscape, and with nature ---one really feels it when you paint,"

Pauline and her husband, watercolour artist, Jake Mol, used to travel and paint together in Europe, France and around the world. Closer to home, they particularly loved going to the lake in Haliburton County, where both could paint en plein air in the beauty of the Algonquin Highlands. Sadly, Jake passed away in 2018. He described Pauline as the "love of his life".

Over the years, Pauline has won many awards and prizes, in addition to being an elected member of the Canadian Society of Painters in Watercolours. She's taught at leading schools such as Blue Mountain School of Landscape Painting and the Haliburton School for the Arts, and as a member of several art associations, she's organized hundreds of events. Too many to list, these include 50 years for an annual watercolour weekend at Geneva Park for the Central and East Central Ontario Art Association!

A dedicated volunteer at TWS, she's served in many official and unofficial ways, including program chair, president, and a director. She also was the first member to reach the Platinum Level of Distinction having been juried into 50+ shows. Many TWS members recall the many skits she's written and produced for holiday meetings and celebrations (including last year's anniversary lunch).

In addition to painting, Pauline's kept busy with her five adult children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren. "One has to keep going, be involved, continue to commit to things, and learn and teach," she notes, "It's how you get better!"

Pauline's been a member of TWS since the first year the society was founded in 1985.

Visions Adjoin


