Art has been a lifelong interest. My subjects are usually chosen from personal experiences, the local area or from ideas collected in my sketchbook. One goal is to achieve a mood or movement, or both, in a painting. I generally paint in acrylic or watercolour, but experiments with other mediums can also be fun. Workshops/classes attended include OCA, Seneca College, Varley Art Gallery, Latcham Gallery and more. I have exhibited with the Lemonville Group of Artists, Art Diversity, and the K. MacFarlane Group of Artists. My work has been presented in a number of shows in the surrounding areas. A highlight during the pandemic was an opportunity to create over eighty illustrations for a friend's memoirs about life on her family's heritage farm in King Township.

From a young age I could be found with a pencil or paints in hand and was encouraged to be creative by my parents, who were both gifted amateur artists. Educated in England, and with access to the abundance of galleries and museums in London, I was also fascinated by the world of art and antiques, and decided to pursue a career in this field.

My career in the art market has spanned five decades and two continents. Before moving to Canada I worked for two major London fine art dealers, Spink & Son (handling numismatics) and Colnaghi (dealing with Indian, Islamic, Chinese and Japanese Art). While at Spink's my design for a new Seychelles 10 Rupee coin was selected in 1974, and in 1976 the Seychelles Government accepted my designs for their Independence 9-coin set. At Colnaghi I was able to develop my interest in Mughal and Rajput painting as well as textiles from Turkey to Japan.

After moving to Toronto with my husband in 1984, I started my own company in 1985, Cognoscenti Connoisseur Lectures, to promote interest in the fine and decorative arts, holding seminars and short courses with international speakers.

In 1987 I joined Christie's and was appointed President of Christie's Canada, and an SVP of Christie's USA. Upon leaving Christie's in 2012, I was appointed Deputy Chairman of Bonhams Canada, advising clients on consignments for sale at international auction. In 2015, I became an independent consultant, dealing primarily with clients wishing to sell property in London or New York.

I have taken numerous charity auctions for institutions and organizations across Canada, and have been involved with museums in different capacities as a committee member or Board member. I sat on the Canadian Friends of the Israel Museum Advisory Committee for some years, and was a Trustee and Chair of the Board of the Textile Museum of Canada, stepping off the Board in 2020.

I have always admired the tradition of watercolour painting in Britain and France. Finding more time in the last few years to indulge my inclinations to try this medium has led me on an interesting journey of discovery. I have taken courses and enjoyed online workshops and I am very much looking forward to doing more of these and finding my own "voice". I am very pleased to be a new member of TWS and looking forward to meeting other members.

Mara Gulens


Writing has always been my passion. But after a bicycle crash that led to a brain injury, writing felt more like work.


